

Dear Congressman Smith,

In April of 2022, I wrote to your office seeking federal funding to address the significant flooding issues we face in the Borough of Eatontown. The project I described to you was estimated to cost approximately \$5,000,000 and consisted of two phases: one phase was to repair and replace infrastructure needed to support the rehabilitation of Wampum Lake Dam and another phase was to perform the upstream flood mitigation required by providing more flood storage in the upper reaches of the Wampum Lake watershed. With your advocacy, we were fortunate to receive \$2,000,000 which we are currently administering via FY 2023 Community Project Funding, B-23-CP-NJ-1033.

I write today to request an additional \$3,000,000 in federal funds for the second phase of the project. Eatontown is an old town with an aging and failing infrastructure. While we annually repair and replace what we can for certain manageable projects such as road paving and sidewalk repair, the funds needed to replace infrastructure associated with the Wampum Lake watershed corridor is outside the capabilities of the municipality.

I am including a copy of my April 20, 2022 letter for your reference. The historical background remains the same as does our need. I thank you and your office for your continued advocacy for the Borough of Eatontown.

Dear Congressman Smith,

I am writing you with the hope of securing much needed funding to address the significant flooding issues we face in the Borough of Eatontown. Our flooding is due to old, undersized and failing infrastructure at Wampum Lake and on properties along the Wampum Lake watershed. An increase in the frequency and volume of significant flooding events exhausts the short-term runoff storage in the watershed. Upstream properties are left flooded and property is destroyed or lost.

Wampum Lake at our Wampum Memorial Park is a beautiful Green Acres funded park at the gateway to Eatontown on the corner of State Highway 35 and Tinton Avenue, a Monmouth County Road. It is also across the street from the soon-to-be redeveloped former Fort Monmouth and adjacent to our Downtown which we recently declared as an Area in Need of Redevelopment. It houses our Veteran's Memorial Plaza and plays host to our Memorial and Veterans Day events. Residents enjoy hiking around and fishing in our lake. It is also the birthplace of Eatontown as that is where Thomas Eaton located his mill over 350 years ago. The dam and spillway of the lake needs certain improvements for compliance with NJDEP Dam Safety standards. These improvements include possible enlargement or overtopping protection as well replacement of the failing and virtually inoperable sluice gates.

Upstream properties are vulnerable to flooding due to inadequate runoff storage. The Sun Eagles Golf Club is one example. When the Lake is flooded and water cannot be released downstream fast enough, water backs up and overtakes our Maxwell Road and Lewis Street. This impedes access to several homes as well as our Department of Public Works where many vehicles are stored. The historic golf course was recently purchased from FMERA and is undergoing a wonderful redevelopment project. Sixty market rate and fifteen affordable units are being built on the course and the historic Gibbs Hall is being renovated to its former glory to create a premier banquet facility. Unfortunately, the flooding is affecting their property. Flooding events create the

need to periodically close one or more of their golf holes and they have lost maintenance equipment as well. They are following modern stormwater management rules, but they simply cannot get rid of the water being pushed *onto* their property.

Pinebrook Road in Eatontown is home to over 1,000 residents in three large apartment housing communities: Wedgewood Gardens, Victoria Gardens and Eatoncrest Apartment Homes. The road itself sees flooding in major storm events, but Eatoncrest Apartment Homes sees a very large amount of water quite often. The apartment complex struggles to find parking for its residents to keep their cars from flooding. Though earnest attempts are made, there are numerous incidents of cars being flooded and destroyed. We see many social media posts and newspaper articles written on the subject. This is particularly heartbreaking because many of the residents do not have the means to replace their losses and are often not insured or under insured. Those who awake to find flooded cars are also without transportation to work and may lose a day's work. In addition to the financial toll, we cannot forget the harm caused in delayed emergency response. Police cars struggle due to the high waters and larger vehicles such as ambulances and fire trucks may not find sturdy ground to park near an incident. Coordinated emergency response is difficult enough in the best of scenarios. Adding flooding and severely limited access places lives in danger. Eatoncrest is following the stormwater management rules applicable to them, but they simply cannot get rid of the water being pushed *onto* their property.

Over the decades, maintenance of stormwater infrastructure has not been a priority of towns, especially smaller ones with limited budgets. Couple this with the increased severity of rain events and the scarcity of land for enhanced stormwater management and towns like mine find themselves in a very precarious situation. We acknowledge the need of these improvements. That is why, in 2019, the Borough conducted a hydrologic and hydraulic analysis. Then, armed with the knowledge of where the water is coming from and its volume, in 2021 we conducted a second engineering study to identify specific flood mitigation strategies we need to employ. Put simply, Eatontown knows where the water is coming from and we know how to fix it. We simply cannot afford to do so.

I write to you with the full support of the entire Governing Body and the municipal family. Problems like these are the reason large scale infrastructure funding bills are necessary. Municipalities such as mine cannot afford to do these projects alone and so they get deferred. Eatontown, for example, spends \$500,000 - \$600,000 each year on road paving and projects. To put it in perspective, the full scope of our request would equal nine to ten years of road projects.

On behalf of the New Jersey Apartment Association (NJAA), and our members who own, manage, and develop both market-rate and affordable rental housing, I write in **strong support** of the Borough of Eatontown's effort to secure federal funds to support the next phase of the project to address flooding in the Borough's Wampum Brook stream corridor. We supported the first phase of the project, and continue to believe that these investments in the community's resiliency would address a longstanding flooding concern and improve the lives of thousands of apartment residents and homeowners.

Apartment owners and other property owners near Wampum Lake have made significant investments in flood mitigation over the years in coordination with the Borough. Nevertheless, flooding concerns persist, which can only be fully addressed through comprehensive improvements to the borough's stormwater management systems. As such, the proposed flood mitigation project would have a direct benefit to thousands of Eatoncrest and Pinebrook Road residents, as well as the ongoing efforts to redevelop Fort Monmouth, which is essential to the economic vitality of the region.

There are 288 properties in Eatontown that have greater than a 26% chance of being severely affected by flooding over the next 30 years. This represents 7% of all properties in the Borough and many of the communities in the Wampum Brook stream corridor. The proposed flood mitigation project will significantly reduce, though not eliminate, this flooding risk, which will have direct effects on improving housing affordability for both homeowners and renters.

The NJAA, and its members in Eatontown, look to continue its partnership with the local officials to not only address these persistent flooding concerns, but to also make ongoing investments in our rental communities to meet the evolving housing needs of the Borough's residents.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING AND SUPPORTING BOROUGH OF EATONTOWN'S COMMUNITY PROJECT FUNDING REQUEST FOR INFRASTRUCTURE IMPROVEMENTS TO ADDRESS FLOODING OF THE WAMPUM LAKE WATERSHED AND AFFECTED PROPERTIES

WHEREAS, the Borough Engineer performed a study of the Wampum Lake watershed as it related to ongoing significant flooding events with ever-increasing frequency; and

WHEREAS, the Borough Engineer's analysis found there is not enough short-term runoff storage available in the water shed resulting in runoff from Wampum Lake into upstream properties including properties which are part of the redevelopment of Fort Monmouth such as the Sun Eagles Golf Couse property and the Howard Commons property; and the Eatontcrest Apartment property; and

WHEREAS, the Borough Engineer has opined that the addition of stormwater basin storage within the watershed and that certain improvements to the dam/spillway are also necessary at Wampum Lake and that such capital improvements cost will cost the Borough approximately \$5,000,000; and


WHEREAS, the New Jersey Apartment Association has submitted a letter to Congressman Smith supporting the Borough's request and indicating that 288 properties within Eatontown have a significant chance of being impacted by severe flooding from the Wampum Lake watershed over the next thirty years; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Borough Council believes it is in the best interest of the Borough and its residents to obtain federal funding to solve the flooding of significant properties within Eatontown arising from the Wampum Lake watershed ; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Borough Council of the Borough of Eatontown, County of Monmouth, State of New Jersey, that it hereby authorizes the Mayor to submit a Community Project Funding Request to the United States Congress through the Honorable Congressman Christopher H. Smith's office.

Dear Representative Smith,

On behalf of the first responders of the Borough of Eatontown, I am respectfully requesting federal financial assistance to support the Community Project Funding. The Borough of Eatontown continues to be plagued by significant flooding based in large part due to old and undersized infrastructure. In particular, Pinebrook Road and Maxwell Road get so significantly flooded that it becomes extremely difficult and arduous to respond to any type of emergency service call in that area. This area of town has 3 apartment complexes with over 1,000 residents, therefore the probability of an emergency call for service is extremely high. Attempting to get to this area when it is flooded causes undue stress on all parties involved as well as the equipment utilized to get to the area, (i.e., police vehicles, ambulances, etc.). Additionally, the integrity of the road continues to deteriorate considerably due to the quality of the infrastructure, causing damage to our vehicles. It delays our response time and puts all involved parties at a greater risk of a situation escalating. Having coordinated response plans with the Fire Department, the First Aid Squad and OEM is not an easy undertaking and it is compounded with the flooding issue.

This Community Project Funding will provide much needed access to this area of town when it is raining and will result in a seamless and efficient way to handle emergency calls. I know that the residents of the Borough would welcome this funding as well.

We understand that you are currently working with the Honorable Congressman Christopher Smith's office regarding potential additional Infrastructure Funding to be used to continue your efforts for flood mitigation in the Borough of Eatontown. We are aware of the occurrences of flooding within the Wampum Lake watershed, which has had specific impacts on upstream properties including along Maxwell Road and Lewis Street, the Suneagles Golf Course, properties along Pinebrook Road, and especially the Eatoncrest Apartments. These events have caused both property damage and accessibility concerns due to flooded roadways/closures for extended periods of time.

We have seen specific impacts and flooding at County Bridge E-2 on the western end of Lewis Street, as well as at County Culvert E-31 around the corner on Maxwell Road. Accordingly, we continue to fully support the Borough's efforts to address flood mitigation in this corridor.

We offer this letter of support to the Borough to further pursue additional funding for this matter, recognizing that the County is not being asked to partially fund or otherwise participate in the funding request.

We are writing to express our full support for the Borough of Eatontown's FY2025 Congressionally Directed Spending request for the Wampum Lake Watershed Flood Mitigation and Dam Improvements Project. The proposed infrastructure would increase flood resiliency for local residents and business owners, as well as improve the quality of life for our most vulnerable populations, including those living in economic poverty, with disabilities, and without health insurance.

As it stands, the Wampum Lake Watershed experiences frequent and intense flooding episodes due to lack of short-term runoff storage within the watershed. This results in water back-ups in the neighboring areas, including the Sun Eagles Golf Course property (a Fort Monmouth redevelopment project that has been forced to closed for days at a time due to flooding), the Howard Commons property (a Fort Monmouth housing property abandoned since the base closure), and the Eatoncrest Apartment Homes property. The Eatoncrest Apartment Home complex, comprised of 450 units, houses many individuals on Section 8 assistance and

those without significant financial means, resulting in our most vulnerable populations facing the most severe impacts from the flooding.

The proposed project is two-fold, as it aims to first increase short-term stormwater storage to reduce ponding/flooding and the damage it causes to local residents, property and businesses; and second perform dam/spillway repairs and improvements to enable the Borough to lower the water level in Wampum Lake in advance of a storm event, as well as bring the dam spillway into NJ Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) compliance.

The Eatontown Recreation Advisory Committee is writing to support the Community Project funding Request Phase 2, to address Wampum Park and Pond. These funds will improve the park property, as well as improve community flooding issues. The property is an important community space.

It is our understanding that the Borough of Eatontown requests funding to improve the Wampum Park infrastructure. Currently, storm flooding results dangerous, unsafe conditions.

Access to outdoor spaces supports mental health. Wampum Park is located in the most densely populated quadrant of our community. Fifty percent of Eatontown residents as well as the majority of our underserved and disabled populations reside in multi-family dwellings and apartment complexes with little or no access to outdoor spaces within this quadrant.

Wampum Park and pond border New Jersey State Highway 35, a heavily traveled road.

The pond is a popular fresh water fishing spot. It is stocked each year to support our community youth fishing derby. The history of this park and pond date back to the 1600's. Thomas Eaton the founder of Eatontown constructed and ran a mill on this property.

We understand that this project was planned to span two phases. We appreciate the Borough's work thus far with the first award granted and fully support the Borough's pursuit of funding for the second phase.
