

Dear Congressman Smith:

I am writing to express my strong support of the Ocean County Utilities Authority (Authority) Sanitary Sewer Pump Station, Piping and Valve Improvements AW1909 Project for inclusion into the Fiscal Year 2025 Community Project Funding.

The OCUA owns and operates forty (40) regional sanitary sewer pump stations throughout its three service areas. Many of the pump stations were constructed in the late 1970's. Much of the piping and valves at each of the OCUA's pumping stations is original, the internal condition is unknown, there are indications of wear, and in some locations, there is evidence of minor leaking. At some of the stations, the existing piping and valving configurations do not provide adequate isolation to maintain the pumps, flow meters, and other equipment installed. This project includes the replacement of isolation valves, check valves, slide gates, and channel covers at several pump stations throughout Ocean County. The project replaces aging infrastructure thereby improving reliability of operation and maintenance of critical wastewater conveyance facilities.

Proper maintenance and operation of sewage conveyance infrastructure is vital to maintaining the health, safety and welfare of residents and visitors in the communities served by these pump stations, which are: Boroughs of Lavallette, South Toms River, Beachwood, Lakehurst, Mantoloking, and the Townships of Berkeley, Manchester, Toms River, Brick, Ocean, Barnegat and Jackson which have a combined population of approximately 155,300, including 123,000 within Congressional District No. 4.

This project is a collaborative effort by the Authority, the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection, and local stakeholders committed to improving the reliability of regional wastewater conveyance assets serving over 155,000 residents and visitors to Ocean County.

THE OCEAN COUNTY UTILITIES AUTHORITY

Federal support through the Community Project Funding program will assist the Authority in meeting the project goals which include: enhancing public health, safety, and welfare, extending the remaining useful life of critical infrastructure, improving receiving water quality in the Atlantic Ocean, Barnegat Bay and local waterways and helping stabilize bulk treatment rates to over 700,000 citizens and visitors to Ocean and Southern Monmouth Counties.

The local sponsor shall be the Ocean County Utilities Authority. The estimated cost of the project is \$3,500,000.00.
